## Congregational Corner

As I talked with *Jonathan Streator*, the face of the little boy that we first met in 2001 kept super-imposing over that of the tall young man who will graduate from Boulder City High School on June 2, 2010. Not surprisingly, he has retained the smile and developed even more charm as he has grown up.

Jonathan and his parents, Devin and Sandy Streator, moved to Boulder City in 1998. After trying out a few churches in town, they came to BCUMC, a choice we as a congregation have benefited from ever since. Jonathan has been one of those benefits, taking part in Sunday school classes up through the Youth class, joining the church as part of the confirmation class in February 2003, serving as an acolyte (until he outgrew the acolyte robes) and helping his dad with the many things it takes to get ready for church services.

Jonathan attended Boulder City schools from 1<sup>st</sup> grade through high school. He's had a few favorite teachers—Mrs. Davidson in 2<sup>nd</sup> grade,

Mrs. Wagner who taught English in middle school, Mrs. Ringen and Mr. Gillette in high school. Reading (mysteries, novels, Harry Potter and Lord of the Rings to name a few), enjoying music ranging from contemporary rock to jazz, movies and his music practice fill out his busy schedule.

His world has not been confined to Boulder City, though. Jonathan has traveled with the People to People program, traveling to Australia one year and to central Europe in 2008. He has traveled with his parents, and spent time with his grandfather in Pennsylvania. Perhaps the most important trip he has taken recently, however, has been to Reno to check out where he will attend school in the fall.

Jonathan has been accepted to the University of Nevada, Reno studying for a degree in music performance. His goal is to perform in Broadway-type productions after graduation, perhaps even on Broadway itself. Until then, he will be

## Pastor's Study

**For God so loved you he gave his only begotten son so that you would not perish. Is that good news, or is that Good News?**

We are blessed by being part of a Christian faith community where we are faithful to each other. We have committed ourselves to create a place of safety and grace for all who want to be part of this church.

Being a member of our church does not save us, nor will it save others. It is Jesus the Christ: Lord and risen from the dead that saves us. We are always challenged by a desire to share and hesitancy to share about God's love. This may result from some confusion about this activity which is from the Greek word *euangelos* normally translated gospel. *Eu* means good and *angelos* means news. Evangelism is proclaiming the good news.

This activity, evangelism, is intentional and is part of the

wide range of God's grace. It is the intentional invitation to another person into the Christian life. Scott Jones in *The Evangelistic Love of God and Neighbor* (2003, Abingdon Press) writes "To evangelize non-Christians without loving them fully is not to evangelize them well. To love the non-Christian without evangelizing them is not to love them well. To love another person fully means offering them an explicit faithful relationship with Christ."

The initiative of saving the world lies with God and people can be initiated into the reign of God outside of the church but if we love others we will want to share the good news. Our desire to share is directly related to our understanding of the message of the Bible. How we speak and how we act demonstrates what we believe is the Bible's message.

At one and the same time evangelism is a divine activity and a human activity. It involves invitation as well as expectation of results. It is personal but involves our whole church. It is a stand alone activity but it is related to other aspects of Christian life and discipleship.

The appropriate human response to God's grace is faith. The church has a role because the church is entrusted with God's self-disclosure. The church is the place of worship and by worship because we love God.

Today we may incorrectly assume a person is a Christian (I prayerfully hope none of these describe any of us) because: 1- they just say they are (ask what that means to them); 2- they have been baptized; 3- their name is on a church membership list somewhere; and 4- they belong to a Christian community but do not practice their faith.

Some things we must keep in mind. Our culture no longer carries the Christian message so it may take a long time relationship with another person for them to learn the language of God's grace, mercy, and love. There are people who do not want to be Christians because they

do not want to be like other Christians. Many people object to what we share because they have seen, heard, or read how others have acted in Christ's name.

We need to stand with the poor and oppressed. We must respect civil and human rights but to not accept other religions is not intolerant. It is important for us to know other religions in order to love them well.

I will close with another Scott Jones quote. "God loves non-Christians. God's grace is at work among non-Christians. Non-Christians may be saved by Christ without explicitly confessing Christ as Savior. Christians should love non-Christians as their primary duty. Loving non-Christians should include evangelizing them"

Who will you share the Good News with this summer?

God bless us all and keep us spiritually, emotionally, and physically safe through the summer.

## Wits' End Corner

Sometimes when Sue gives the newsletter contributors a deadline, I remember an article I have read somewhere that has nagged me to share it with you. And as Sue said, "No need to reinvent the wheel." I agree, without feeling guilty about not being original. That being said, I want to share something I recently read, along with the explanation of how I came to read it.

As most of you know my health has been less than stellar this last year. Several members of the congregation have been kind enough to take me to doctor appointments when my daughter, Diane, could not. One of these faithful people has been Jenn Haag. She not only accompanies me, she takes notes regarding my doctor's instructions. Then she goes home, transcribes them on her computer and e-mails them to me. ## Update from the Church Council Land Development Project (Phase II)

Over the past several weeks we have solicited bids for the development of our land. We have received three bids from three different contractors. All three of those bids were far greater than we had anticipated (\$540,000 to \$800,000) and certainly far more than we can afford; our current fund is at about \$340,000.

At this point we are now going to explore a number of possibilities that may be able to reduce that amount down to a more manageable sum. Included:

- Discuss with the contractors items in the development plan that could easily be eliminated, or that should be omitted.
- Research the possibilities of grant money that may be available to cover some of the perimeter improvements that are required.
- Discuss with the City ways in which we may be able to receive assistance with the development plan, including items they might be willing to allow us to postpone.
- Look at the possibility of using a local sub-contractor instead of paying the greater cost of a general contractor.

By September we should have the answers to these questions. If the total cost of proceeding is still in excess of our resources, then we will need to discuss how Phase II can be broken down into two or more steps, and then accomplish only what our financial resources would permit us to do.

Under no circumstances will we incur indebtedness to accomplish more than we have cash on hand to utilize.

Meanwhile, our church building fund continues to slowly grow. The Finance Committee continues to seek ways to raise money for the fund, and we encourage all of you in our church family, and friends of the family, to continue your contributions to the Building Fund.

Please be assured that our progress and decisions in this area are being made by very knowledgeable and experienced people in the areas of finance, construction and government relationships.

The tally will be reported at our Annual Conference. If you would rather donate funds to be used to buy the needed supplies, an offering box on the back table will also be available for cash or checks made out to the church. SO FAR 193 toiletry items & \$10 was delivered to Boulder City Emergency Aid, collected as part of the "Partners in Community" drive for the annual conference Task Force on Children & Poverty

## Julia Ward Howe: Mother's Day and Peace

### Beyond the Battle Hymn of the Republic

Julia Ward Howe's accomplishments did not end with the writing of her famous poem, "The Battle Hymn of the Republic." As Julia became more famous, she was asked to speak publicly more often. Her husband became less adamant that she remain a private person, and while he never actively supported her further efforts, his resistance eased.

She saw some of the worst effects of the war ~ not only the death and disease which killed and maimed the soldiers. She worked with the widows and orphans of soldiers on both sides of the war, and realized that the effects of the war go beyond the killing of soldiers in battle. She also saw the economic devastation of the Civil War, the economic crises that followed the war, the restructuring of the economies of both North and South.

In 1870, Julia Ward Howe took on a new issue and a new cause. Distressed by her experience of the realities of war, determined that peace was one of the two most important causes of the world (the other being equality in its many forms) and seeing war arise again in the world in the Franco-Prussian War, she called in 1870 for women to rise up and oppose war in all its forms. She wanted women to come together across national lines, to recognize what we hold in common above what divides us, and commit to finding peaceful resolutions to conflicts. She issued a declaration, hoping to gather together women in a congress of action.

She failed in her attempt to get formal recognition of a Mother's Day for Peace. Her idea was influenced by Anna Jarvis, a young Appalachian homemaker who had attempted starting in 1858 to improve sanitation through what she called

Mothers' Work Days. She organized women throughout the Civil War to work for better sanitary conditions for both sides, and in 1868 she began work to reconcile Union and Confederate neighbors.

Anna Jarvis' daughter, also named Anna Jarvis, would of course have known of her mother's work, and the work of Julia Ward Howe. Much later, when her mother died, this second Anna Jarvis started her own crusade to found a memorial day for women. The first such Mother's Day was celebrated in West Virginia in 1907 in the church where the elder Anna Jarvis had taught Sunday School. And from there the custom caught on ~ spreading eventually to 45 states. Finally the holiday was declared officially by states beginning in 1912, and in 1914 the President, Woodrow Wilson, declared the first national Mother's Day.
